#### How can you pay for X but have to cut Y?

As a school Superintendent I am frequently asked many questions related to the management and operations of a school. One such question typically centers around how we are able to afford a new bus and/or building but potentially need to reduce staff in the interim. How can this be the case?

The answer to this question lies in school finance and what the law implicitly allows schools to do. For example, school accounting is not just made up of one big checkbook with an unlimited amount of funds (ultimately taxpayer dollars). There are several accounts that range from state specific (which are highly regulated) to more locally controlled proprietary/enterprise funds (which have more flexibility at the local level).

A school's general fund is one of the largest funds and is solely responsible for staff salaries, instruction, utilities and many daily operational functions. Many districts have 80% of this fund accounted for in salaries and benefits. The general fund is a major predictor of the financial health of the district. If the general fund is strong then the health of the district usually follows. If the general fund falters then specific actions need to be taken to maintain the integrity of this fund. The general fund is replenished annually using a combination of state aid (including supplemental state aid) and local tax dollars. This fund is the primary fund used to pay staff salaries and benefits. For this reason we do everything we can as a district to find other means to pay for larger expenditures.

These other means of funding come in the form of funds like the Physical Plant and Equipment Levy (PPEL), the Statewide Penny (SAVE) and any specific categorical funding (i.e. Title I, English Language Learning and At-Risk) that the law allows us to utilize. Without the PPEL and the SAVE funds our district would not be in the situation we are today with respect to updated technology, maintaining safe and functional transportation and overall facility upgrades. So the answer to the question, albeit not a simple one, is that every fund has a purpose and some are more limiting than others. The reason we can buy a bus or fix a roof but may otherwise have to reduce a staff member is all predicated on the health of the district's various funding resources and what the law affords us the opportunity to utilize or not.

Forty teams qualified for the State Basketball Tournament after days, weeks and months of practice. Another championship caliber team that will show its talent Friday and Saturday night has practiced for just a few hours. That team is the All-Iowa Honor Dance, which has become a tradition at the Girls State Basketball Tournament.


## **BOOK** Fair

Information Literacy continues to be the main push in library classes. The second graders are getting more acquainted with our online catalog (http://.wg.follettdestiny.com), and the third graders are learning about safe search sites that they can use when they need to do research. Fourth and fifth graders are learning not to believe everything they hear or see on the internet, but to test it for reliability. Moving up to middle school, eighth graders are learning tricks and tips for choosing reliable resources for their current research on World War II. They've also learned how to use Heartland AEA's SuperSearch, a huge database similar to what they'll find in college. At the ELC, kindergarteners and first graders are working their way through the Goldfinch Honor list in preparation of voting for their favorite book. Results of voting for the school and state will be announced this month.

As summer draws near, don't forget that students have access to e-books to read online it they wish. They just need to log in to their library account and search Universal Search. E-books will be listed under "Digital" and when they click on "Open," the book will open in MackinVia. No additional login required!

#### H.U.S.H

H.U.S.H is an acronym that stands for Help Us Stop Hunger which is a program that helps feed needy families in Iowa, through hunters donating deer. Since the beginning of the H.U.S.H program in 2003 there have been a varying differences in donations, highest being 2007 with over 8,000 deer donated. This and many more benefits come from the H.U.S.H program. H.U.S.H history: there are over 83 lockers participating in H.U.S.H in the counties below. For each deer donated, the locker will receive \$75, and even the Food Bank of



Iowa receives a \$5 administrative cost for each deer. Even buying a deer license is helping benefit H.U.S.H because every license comes with a \$1 surcharge that goes to the program. H.U.S.H does have some requirements that must be met before any donations can be made. The first is, of course, the deer must be legally-taken deer. Second is if you make a donation, you must donate the whole deer. Third is the deer must be fielddressed (gutted). Fourth and final is that a locker will not accept a road kill deer. H.U.S.H has helped feed many needy families from the birth of the program in 2003. From 2003 to 2014 there have been 63,352 deer donated, providing 10.1 million meals to the hungry in Iowa. For my senior project I personally contributed by donating 2 deer that I got this past hunting season.
